CHILDREN ARE ZONES OF PEACE



This means children should not be attacked or asked to join wars. They should always be protected and should be able to go to school or the hospital.

Schools, madaris, hospitals, places of worship and indigenous cultural importance, evacuation centers, should not be attacked and used by soldiers or armed groups.

CHILDREN ARE TREATED AS VICTIMS



Children used as soldiers or fighters who commit crimes must be treated as victims. They cannot go to jail.

They should go through rehabilitation and may be placed in a center. Children who commit grave child rights violations might still have criminal responsibility but it depends on the circumstances of the crime.

CHILD SOLDIERS ARE TO BE RESCUED



The AFP soldier, police, or any other who has the child should call the Local Council for the Protection of Children, Local Social Welfare and Development Officer, or the Council for the Welfare of Children. They should help the child and provide clean water, clothes, food, a place to sleep. The child will undergo rehabilitation and, when ready, will be returned to his or her family.



THE RIGHTS OF CHILDREN IN SITUATIONS OF ARMED CONFLICT

Children are victims. The law seeks to rescue, rehabilitate, and reintegrate the child into the family and community.



Right to be alive. The government should make sure children survive and develop well.



Right to be treated as victims and not criminals. Children should be rescued, rehabilitated, and reintegrated into their families and communities.



Right to be respected and protected from attacks, acts of violence, and grave child rights violations.



Right to not be recruited as soldiers or have any involvement in wars.



Right to be protected from being hurt in any way or killed.



Right to clean water, food, clothes, a place to sleep, and medicines. They should be allowed to go to school.



Right to believe what they want to believe, think what they want to think, and speak in a language they know.



Right to identity. Children should be able to get documents they need like a birth certificate all the time.



Right to be treated equally and not differently without reason.



Right to privacy.



Right to a lawyer. If they cannot pay, they should be given a lawyer for free.



Right to the protection of their family's property and things.



Right to be protected from harm especially in situations of armed conflict.



Right to be listened to by adults.

The law establishes an **Inter-Agency Committee on CSAC** to be chaired by the Council for the Welfare of Children, that will ensure its implementation. Within 90 days after the effectivity of the law, all concerned agencies, including the AFP and PNP, are also directed to submit an inventory of all children in situations of armed conflict under their custody.

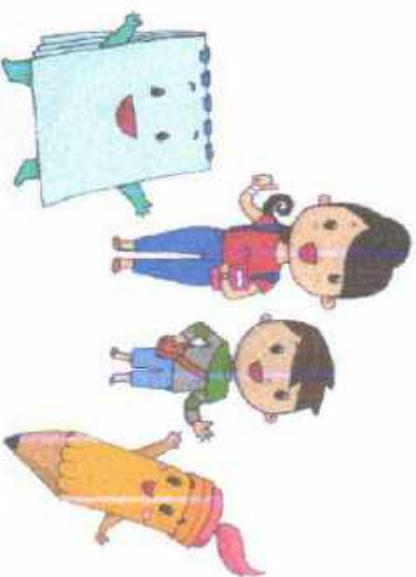
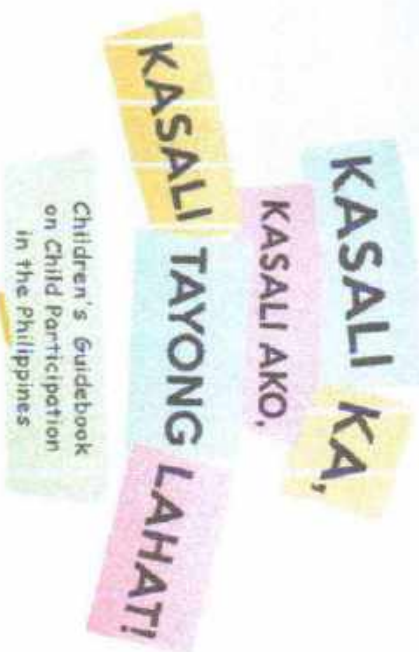
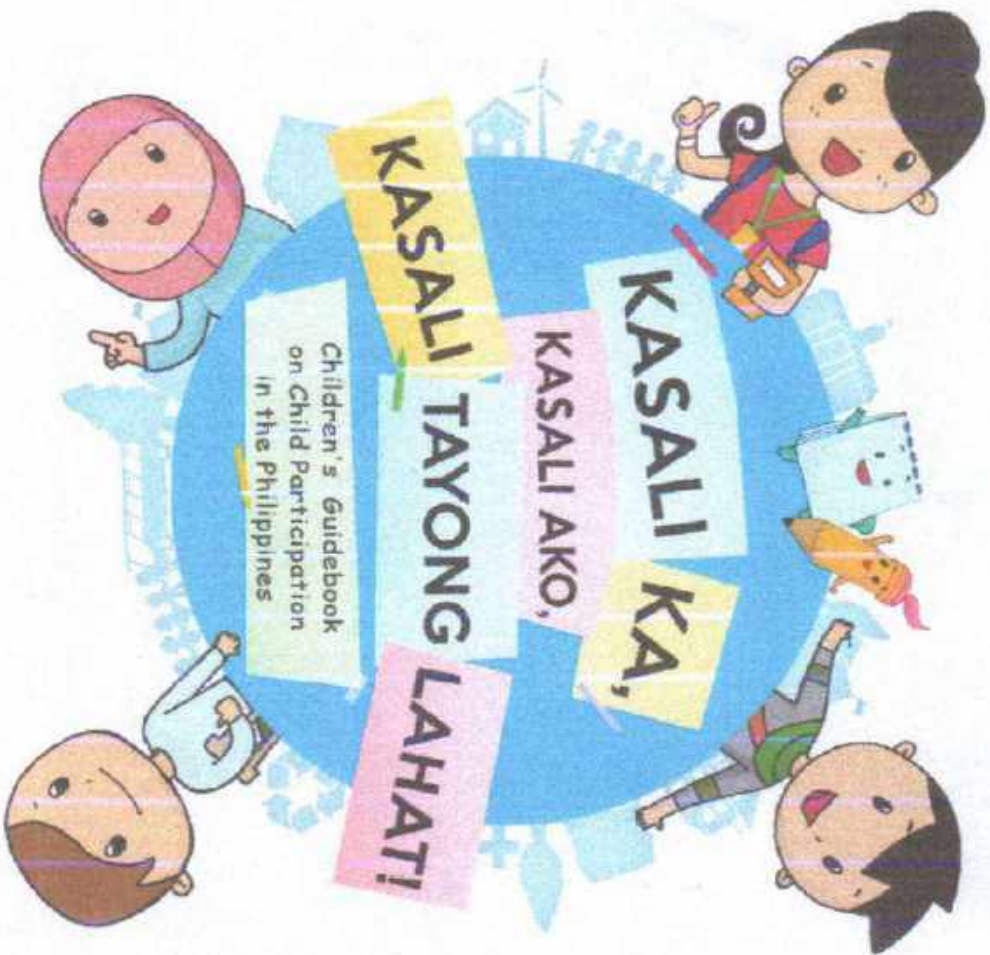

DEFINITION OF TERMS

1. **Child** – is a person who is below eighteen years old. People who are eighteen years old and over but could not take care of themselves or protect themselves from abuse because of physical or mental disabilities are also considered as children. (Article 1 of the UNCRC and Section 3 of RA 7610.)
2. **Participation** – is the act of taking part or sharing in something. Example: Teachers often encourage class participation. (The American Heritage Dictionary)
3. **Child Participation** – is the right of all children to be heard and give their opinion on issues that concerns them. They should be free to express themselves, be with others and get information they need. (Art. 12, UNCRC).
4. **The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child** (UNCRC) – is a human rights treaty where the civil, political, economic, social, health, and cultural rights of children are clearly stated. It was adopted by the UN General Assembly on 20 November 1989. The UN CRC was put into action on 2 September 1990. There are 196 countries that have approved and signed the treaty.
5. **Local Council for the Protection of Children** (LCPC) – is a council organized in the barangay, municipal, city and provincial levels that take care of the wellbeing and rights of all children. The LCPC puts into action all the children's programs from the barangay up to the provincial level.
6. **National Committee on Child and Youth Participation** (NCCYP) – is composed of all organization and agencies that promote child participation. It serves as a forum for discussion and sharing of support among member organizations. The Council for the Welfare of Children sits as the Secretariat of NCCYP.

Chapter 1: JOIN US!

7. **National Framework on Child and Youth Participation** – is the basis for promoting child participation in the Philippines. The document contains the definition of child participation, the general standards and steps in promoting safe and meaningful child participation, and examples of actual experiences of child participation in different settings. It was adopted by the CWC Board in 2004.

8. **National Anti-Poverty Commission (NAPC)** – is a Philippine government agency that ensures the participation of all marginalized sectors in government decision-making processes. It was created because of RA 8425, the "Social Reform and Poverty Alleviation Act," which took effect on 30 June 1998.

9. **National Anti-Poverty Commission Children Basic Sector (NAPC-CBS)** – is the segment of the National Anti-Poverty Commission that represents the children sector of the Philippine society.



What do Articles 2, 3, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 19, 34, 36 and 42 of UNCRC say?

Children have rights to be heard and give their opinion on issues that concerns them. They should be free to express themselves, be with others and get information they need.

Children should be encouraged to participate according to their age, experience and evolving capacity.

Children's participation should be for their own good and will improve their lives and abilities. They need the guidance of adults in deciding what is best for them according to their developing capability.

All children have an equal right to participate.

All children should be protected from any abuse.

Children's views should be considered in decision-making.



UNCRC Article 12.1 states that the government has to take care of the children's right to form and express their own views. These views should be considered based on their age and experience. Children or their representatives should be given a chance to speak in any judicial or administrative hearing.

UNCRC Article 13.1 also declares children's right to self-expression. This includes the freedom to gather and spread information. This information may come in any form chosen by the child such as in print or art work.

Children like me should be part of organizing projects and programs for kids. We should also join in making sure our rights are protected. All these are here in UN Convention on the Rights of the Child.

In 2002, the document "A World Fit for Children" or WFFC was made during the UN General Assembly Special Session on Children (UNGASS).



Important points in A World Fit for Children (WFFC)

Children and adolescents are free to express their thoughts according to their capacity. It is important that they join in making decisions at home, in school and in the government. More programs that promote child participation should be created.

Come join us!



Here in the Philippines, children are usually not allowed to join the conversation of grown-ups. Children's views are not considered in making decisions. But this is changing as organizations and agencies are pushing for child participation.

CHILD PARTICIPATION IN THE PHILIPPINES

The National Committee on Child and Youth Participation (NCCYP) was established to unite all organization and agencies that promote child participation. Through NCCYP, member organizations can discuss, share and support each other.

Members of the NCCYP created the National Framework on Child and Youth Participation. This is the basis for promoting child participation in the Philippines. The Framework is supported by the Council for the Welfare of Children, National Committee on Child and Youth Participation, and UNICEF Philippines Office.

A study entitled, "The Case Studies on Child and Youth Participation in the Philippines" was conducted. The study documented and analyzed child participation practices in different programs by NCCYP members. The effect, process and quality of child participation were studied. The National Framework on Child Participation was also reviewed.

In time for the National Children's Month, the Guidebook on Child Participation in the Philippines was published and launched. The guidebook was developed by CWC and NCCYP. A workshop was conducted in 2013 to identify all the items to be included in the book and its overall design. It is the plan of NCCYP is to come up with a child-friendly guidebook.

The Case Studies on Child and Youth Participation in the Philippines showed that child participation results in positive changes in the lives of children. They become better in expressing themselves, become more sociable and confident. And the more they participate, the more they are capable of defending themselves from any abuse or inequality.

The study called for a practical tool that will give meaningful child participation. The Guidebook on Child Participation in the Philippines was then developed by Council for the Welfare of Children (CWC) and NCCYP.

It is based on the National Framework on Child and Youth Participation and UN Standards on Child Participation.

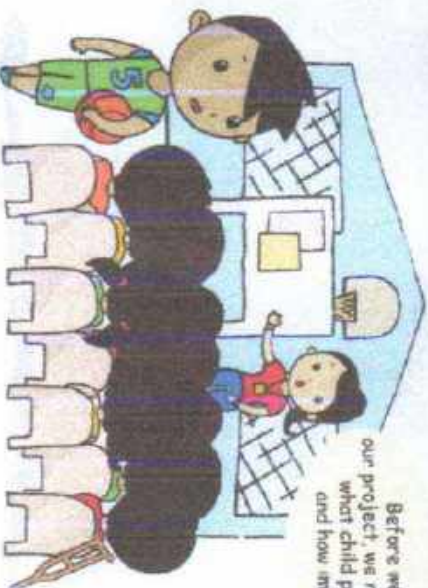

6. The guidebook can be used in choosing child representatives for the Local Councils for the Protection of Children (LCPC) at the barangay, city, municipality and provincial levels.

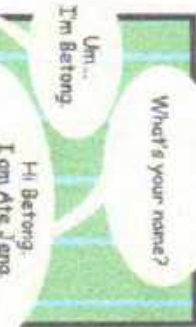

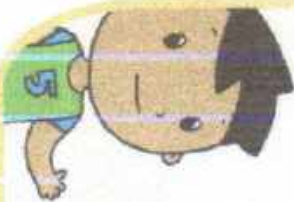
